

Recently, I read a post on Next Door from a person who was looking for a metal detector so that she could locate the survey stakes on the edge of her property. She wanted to install some new raised beds in her yard and wanted to be sure she positioned them in her own yard. I responded that the library has a metal detector in its Library of Things. A few days later, she posted that she had gone online and reserved the metal detector on our website and picked it up at the library during our front door service hours. 



## *Braiding Sweetgrass*



As a botanist, Robin Wall Kimmerer has been trained to ask questions of nature with the tools of science. As a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, she embraces the notion that plants and animals are our oldest teachers. In *Braiding Sweetgrass*, Kimmerer brings these two lenses of knowledge together to take us on “a journey that is every bit as mythic as it is scientific, as sacred as it is historical, as clever as it is wise” (Elizabeth Gilbert).

Kimmerer shows how other living beings—asters and goldenrod, strawberries and squash, salamanders, algae, and sweetgrass—offer us gifts and lessons, even if we’ve forgotten how to hear their voices. In a rich braid of reflections that range from the creation of Turtle Island to the forces that threaten its flourishing today, she circles toward a central argument: that the awakening of a wider ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings will we be capable of understanding the generosity of the earth and learn to give our own gifts in return.

**Robin Wall Kimmerer** is a mother, scientist, decorated professor, and enrolled member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation. She is also the author of *Gathering Moss: A Natural and Cultural History of Mosses*. She lives in Syracuse, New York, where she is a SUNY Distinguished Teaching Professor of Environmental Biology, and the founder and director of the Center for Native Peoples and the Environment.



Learn about community-based strategies, beaver-based solutions, and native food plants utilized at the Vesper Meadow Restoration Preserve and how they can be applied to lands across the region. Jeanine Moy, Founder and Director of the Vesper Meadow Education Program, will discuss ongoing projects with the Southwest Oregon Indigenous Gardens Network, local endangered species habitat restoration and monitoring, and examples of local edible and medicinal native plants that anyone can grow in their yard.

*Braiding Sweetgrass* teaches lessons on the interconnectedness of nature and what can be learned by slowing down and observing the natural world and its cycles. Kimmerer is a scientist whose Native American heritage informs her scientific work. This kit includes guides to common local birds, a flyer with information about how to be involved with Cornell University's Project Feederwatch, a bird data recording sheet, information about birdwatching materials that can be checked out from the library, and materials to make a pine cone bird feeder. This kit is offered in partnership with the North Mountain Park Nature Center in Ashland.

*Braiding Sweetgrass* emphasizes the importance of gratitude for and reciprocity with the land and its gifts. Use this kit to make beautiful plant-able paper with flower seeds incorporated into the fibers. The seed paper can be kept and planted or given to others with the hope that they will plant the paper, thereby giving back to the land.

In *Braiding Sweetgrass*, Robin Wall Kimmerer says, “Many Native peoples across the world, despite myriad cultural differences, have this in common—we are rooted in cultures of gratitude.” She reminds readers to recognize the power of gratitude and contentment with what we have. Use this kit to incorporate a practice of gratitude into your life through letter writing. Kits include stationery, stamped envelopes, scrapbook-style embellishments, and information about the benefits of practicing gratitude.

*Braiding Sweetgrass* uses the Three Sisters Garden as an example of reciprocity. When planted together, the success of each plant—corn, beans, and squash—leads to all three thriving. This kit contains supplies to plant your own Three-Sisters Garden: seeds, seed starter trays, potting soil, and instructions. It will also provide information how these plants work together to help each other grow and on the significance of these food crops to many indigenous groups in North America.

Wild rice is a staple food in traditional diets of Native American tribes of the Great Lakes region. This kit contains ingredients to make wild rice soup in standard, gluten free, and vegan versions.



# Indian No More

Regina Petit's family has always been Umpqua, and living on the Grand Ronde Tribe's reservation is all ten-year-old Regina has ever known. Her biggest worry is that Sasquatch may actually exist out in the forest. But when the federal government enacts a law that says Regina's tribe no longer exists, Regina becomes "Indian no more" overnight—even though she lives with her tribe and practices tribal customs, and even though her ancestors were Indian for countless generations. In this moving middle-grade novel drawing upon Umpqua author Charlene Willing McManis's own tribal history, Regina must find out: Who is Regina Petit? Is she Indian, American, or both? And will she and her family ever be okay?

**Charlene Willing McManis** (1953-2018) was born in Portland, Oregon, and grew up in Los Angeles. She was of Umpqua tribal heritage and enrolled in the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde. In 2016, Charlene received a mentorship with award-winning poet and author Margarita Engle through We Need Diverse Books. That manuscript became *Indian No More*, which is based on her family's experiences after their tribe was terminated in 1954. She passed away in 2018, knowing that her friend Traci Sorell would complete the revisions Charlene was unable to finish.

**Traci Sorell** writes fiction and nonfiction books as well as poems for children. A former federal Indian law attorney and policy advocate, she is an enrolled citizen of the Cherokee Nation and lives in northeastern Oklahoma, where her tribe is located.

# The Marrow Thieves

In *The Marrow Thieves*, the world has been ravaged by global warming. Cities have crumbled from the coastlines, “breaking off like crust,” and hurricanes, earthquakes, and tsunamis have wiped out entire communities. Millions of people have lost their lives, and those who remain have endured trauma that has led to their inability to dream—with the exception of North America’s Indigenous peoples, who carry dreams in webs woven into their bone marrow. Readers are thrust into the complex lives of rich and nuanced characters forced to navigate a world that too closely resembles our own.

Author **Cherie Dimaline** spent many years working in and for Indigenous communities and now lives in her home territory where she is a registered and active member of the Georgian Bay Metis Community. She is currently writing for television, working on a new novel, as well as adapting her book *Empire of Wild* for the stage and screen. *Hunting by Stars* (Abrams US and Penguin Canada), the sequel to *The Marrow Thieves*, was released in October 2021.



Inspired by the many Indigenous-led movements across North America, *We Are Water Protectors* issues an urgent rallying cry to safeguard the Earth's water from harm and corruption—a bold and lyrical picture book.

Author **Carole Lindstrom** is Anishinabe/Métis and is a proud member of the Turtle Mountain Band of Ojibwe Indians. She was born and raised in Nebraska and currently makes her home in Maryland.

Illustrator **Michaela Goade** is a graphic designer living and working in Juneau, Alaska, where she was also raised. Her childhood was spent in the forests and on the beaches of Southeast Alaska and her artistic style is rooted in the depth and beauty of its landscapes. Forever inspired by the coastal wilds of Southeast Alaska, she works to capture its magic and honor its vibrant cultures. Michaela is from the Raven moiety and Kiks.ádi Clan from Sitka, Alaska.

Como botánica, Robin Wall Kimmerer está capacitada para cuestionar la naturaleza usando las herramientas de la ciencia. Como miembro de Citizen Potawatomi Nation, adopta la noción que las plantas y los animals son nuestros más antiguos maestros. En *Una trenza de hierba sagrada*, Kimmerer hace convergir estos dos tipos de conocimientos para transportarnos en "a journey that is every bit as mythic as it is scientific, as sacred as it is historical, as clever as it is wise" (Elizabeth Gilbert).

Kimmerer muestra como otros seres vivos – margarita cimarrona y vara de oro, fresas y calabazas, salamandras, algas y hierba dulce – nos ofrecen regalos y lecciones, incluso cuando hemos olvidado cómo escuchar sus voces. En esta rica trenza de reflexiones que van desde la creación de Turtle Island a las fuerzas que amenazan su florecimiento hoy día, ella va rumbo a un argumento central: que el despertar a una mayor conciencia ecológica requiere reconocer y celebrar nuestra relación recíproca con el resto del mundo viviente. Vive en Syracuse, New York donde es una distinguida profesora de biología ambiental de SUNY, y la fundadora y directora del Center for Native Peoples and the Environment.





La familia de Regina Petit siempre ha sido Umpqua y vivir en la Reserva Grand Ronde Tribe es todo lo que Regina de 10 años ha sabido. Su mayor preocupación es que Sasquatch pudiera realmente existir en el bosque. Pero cuando el gobierno federal promulga una ley que dice que la tribu de Regina ya no existe, Regina “no es india más” de la noche a la mañana—aunque vive con su tribu, practicando sus costumbres tribales y a pesar que sus ancestros fueron indios por un sinfín de generaciones. En esta emotiva novela de escuela secundaria recurriendo a la historia tribal propia de la autora Charlene Willing, Regina debe averiguar: ¿Quién es Regina Petit? ¿Es india, americana, o ambas? ¿Y va a estar bien ella y su familia alguna vez?

**Charlene Willing McManis** (1953-2018) nació en Portland, Oregon, y se crió en Los Angeles. Era de herencia tribal Umpqua y bajo registro de Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde. En el 2016, Charlene recibió tutoría con la galardonada poeta y autora Margarita Engle a través de We Need Diverse Books. Ese manuscrito se convirtió en *Indian No More*, que se basa en las experiencias de su familia después que se excluyera a su tribu en 1954. Falleció en el 2018 a sabiendas que su amiga Traci Sorell llevaría a cabo las revisiones que Charlene no pudo terminar.

**Traci Sorell** escribe libros de ficción y no ficción así como poemas para niños. Anteriormente fue abogada de ley nativa federal y defensora de dichas políticas, registrada como ciudadana de la Nación Cherokee y vive en el noreste de Oklahoma, donde se ubica su tribu.





# The Marrow Thieves BY CHERIE DIMALINE

En *The Marrow Thieves*, el mundo ha quedado devastado debido al calentamiento global.
